"They (DR Horton) received an early Christmas present and we would like one too instead of coal in our stocking," he said.

The residents of Village Grande found out a few weeks ago that the money had been released to the developer before the repairs had been made, according to Mr. Weisser.

The township returned the money to the developer in "human error," according to Mr. Hary.

"We were supposed to continue to hold for the maintenance guarantee," he said.

The administration will try to get the money back from the developer either willingly or it will take them to court.

developer, the administration would reimburse it to the public works account.

Councilwoman Linda Geevers said during the meeting that the council did not receive a letter from Village Grande's attorney and asked Mr. Weisser or his attorney to re-send it to the council. She said she also understands the situation is a "safety issue."

"Let's put this at the highest priority right now, especially with the weather going to be changing soon," Ms. Geevers said.

An update on the issue is expected at the next council meeting on Nov. 28, according to Mr. Hary.

Bollywood comes to town

WEST WINDSOR — Students and the audience had a chance to dance Bollywood style at the West Windsor Arts Center Saturday night.

The event was called Bollywood High and was a fundraiser for the arts center with a standing-room-only crowd.

It was to share the Indian culture through dance, music and food.

"It is exciting to have events like this that celebrate the culture diversity of our community," said Corinna Bisgaier, program director.

Jharna Rastogi of Plainboro is a dance teacher who teaches Indian classical (Bharat-Natyam), folk and Bollywood dancing at the center.

"Bollywood incorporates dance styles from all over the world. One can see influences of Indian classical, folk, hip-hop, flamenco and various other dance forms," Ms. Rastogi said.

She has been teaching at the center since last spring and has about nine students who are under 12 years old at the art center. Ms. Rastogi teaches classes privately, through the school Timeless Music Inc., a performing arts organization, established in Princeton in 2000, where she is the co-director.

Ms. Rastogi choreographed the dances that showcased various dance styles from India in Bollywood dance.

The students at the arts center had less than three weeks to practice and some of her other students had spent eight to twelve weeks preparing for the performance, according to Ms. Rastogi.

"My goal was to show the individual talent of each student," Ms. Rastogi said.

At the end, chairs were moved out of the way and the audience got a chance to learn how to Bollywood dance.

"Very rarely does one get an opportunity to get the audiences to participate with you," Ms. Rastogi said. "I had so much fun having the entire audience dance along with me at the end of the show."
